


PULPIT SUPPLY


SEARCH & CALL UPDATE

END OF AN ERA FOR FCC

We only have ONE more volunteer meals on wheels delivery! NEI3A is making changes to its home delivered meal program effective January 1, 2024. For most locations, it will be transitioning to a "shipped meals" model where cold meals are shipped directly to

consumers' addresses rather than NEI3A volunteers delivering hot meals. This change has been made for several reasons: NEI3A has implemented this system in remote areas for several years, and consumer feedback has been positive. This allows service to any address in the NEI3A area. Previously meals could only be delivered to individuals who lived in select communities with home meal programs.

This delivery system accommodates specific diets and food restrictions, better serving people who live with a variety of conditions that restrict their diets. This better accommodates inclement weather as delivery days may be adjusted, allows more choice for consumers as they select meals to be delivered, is more cost effective and will allow NEI3A to serve more consumers. Increases in food costs and unfortunately decreases in funding has also impacted this program. So a box of 10 meals will be delivered every 2 weeks either by the new meal contractor's delivery person or possibly by UPS or Fed Ex.

A little history: The meals on wheels concept started in the UK in the 1940s. The first US program was in Philadelphia in 1954. The Older Americans Act was signed in 1965 and reauthorized to fund area agencies on aging in 1973. And that's when AAAs started coordinating home delivered meals across the US including Waterloo.
